
Paddington tube station interchange interpretation 3

Is Paddington one or two tube stations? The in-car strip map shows it as two but there are varying interpretations on these all-line diagrams.

Paddington (Praed Street: Bakerloo, Circle and District lines) and Paddington (Bishop's Road: Circle and Hammersmith & City lines) are two separate stations about 300m apart at opposite ends of the main line station. The official TfL interpretation is misleading and must cause distress for a new user with heavy suitcase.











- × j shows the two stations correctly positioned but doesn't show the out-of-station interchange
- Interestingly, b, c, d, f, j, k and l loop the Bakerloo Line down correctly adding additional bends
- Sameboat introduces the Moscow style circular interchange symbol
- Examples are tube only maps (no National Rail, some show Elizabeth line)
- Edgware Road included as part of the area geometry
